Charlottesville, Virginia (4/18/2016) – QuickStart Tennis of Central Virginia (QCV) is pleased to report the inaugural Crozet Tennis Day was a hit! Tennis was played in PE classes at Brownsville and Crozet Elementary all day. The Western Albemarle High School Girls' Tennis Team logged a victory at home over Louisa County High School in the afternoon. The highlight was the Tennis Festival for Crozet Elementary first-graders on the QuickStart Tennis courts at the school. The event was organized by Crozet PE teacher Dawn Laine and Principal Gwedette Crummie with an assist from QCV. Volunteers for the festival included Dustin Taylor, UVa Men's Assistant Tennis Coach and Harrison Richmond, UVa team member, three members of the WAHS Girls' Team — Lauren Kearns, Savannah Diamond and Molly Servine — and their coach, Ellen Markowitz, QCV President Alina Ackenbom, QCV Treasurer Roy Harrill and QCV Founder Lynda Harrill. Also attending the festivities were Ann Mallek, Board of Supervisors member for the Whitehall District, Jonno Alcaro, At-Large School Board member, Matt Hass, Deputy Superintendent for the Albemarle County Public Schools and Bridget Condon, Sports Reporter/Anchor for the Newsplex. First-grade teachers Sarah Ackenbom, Katie McFarland and Virginia Slechta joined in the FUN on court.
